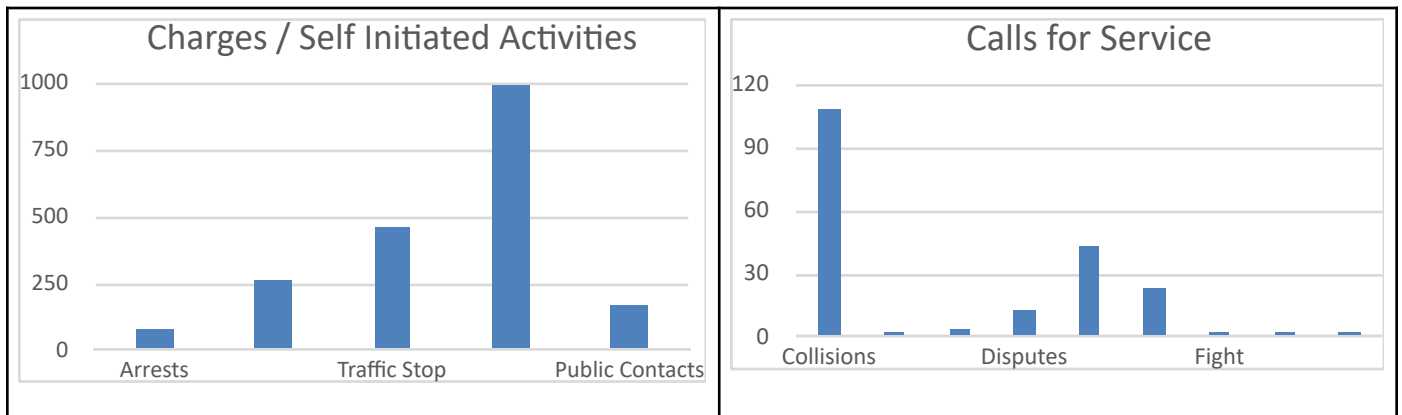


# ERLANGER POLICE

### Programs / News:

- Officer Ryan Collins was sworn in as a lateral officer. He came to the city of Erlanger with 6 years of experience from Middlesboro Police Department. Welcome Ofc. Collins

### Training:

- CPR recertification was conducted in the police department
- Critical Combat Care training was conducted during CPR recert (two officers utilized Tourniquet training this month on calls)
- Detectives Holmstrom and Jansen attended a 3-day course for "Oxygen" cellphone downloading for investigations.
- Officer Collins is in phase 1 of Field Training

### Investigations/Case Highlights:

- Officer Loudermilk was the first officer to arrive at the scene, located the victim, and immediately assessed her condition and attempted to render aid. Recognizing that lifesaving measures were not possible, he shifted focus to securing the scene, assisting other officers in clearing the residence. Officer Loudermilk maintained clear and timely communication with the rest of the shift, providing investigative updates that ultimately contributed to locating both the suspect vehicle and the suspect. Specialist Hartke responded to the original scene with his K9 partner and provided assistance to the fullest extent possible. Using observations made during the initial response, he played a key role in the search for the suspect vehicle. His efforts led to its successful discovery in a remarkably short period of time. Both Officer Loudermilk and Specialist Hartke exhibited professionalism, teamwork, and dedication to duty. Their actions reflect great credit upon themselves and the department. (Credit: Sgt.
